

My story, through Mt Maria I also had part time jobs before and after school starting at 3am till 7am weekdays and working weekends to assist my family with school fees. When leaving school I went to work at PGH Clay Bricks and Pavers at Strathpine as a Laboratory Assistant and worked my way through the company learning all facets of business from Operations, Administration , Sales , Logistics and Production Improvement, holding management and supervisory roles.

On Leaving that position I went to work for the Family Company Timms Haulage (Earthmoving) as Operations Manager, then branching away from the family I worked for Quirks Refrigeration (Commercial) as QLD State Operations Manager, managing again all aspects of the business through the state but also NSW and VIC. Decided then that Earthmoving was calling me back managed my own business for just over 10 years working on many projects including ICB, Westfields Chermside, David Jones (Queen Street), QRAIL upgrades, Airport Link, and many more.

Currently working as Real Estate Agent for Peter Campbell Realty in Albany Creek a family company since 1970 how ironic.

Always lived in Brisbane but have travelled to USA, New Zealand and Singapore and want to travel more.

I am a father of 3 sons and 1 daughter.

Following our final year at Mt Maria I started training as a Nurse at the Royal Brisbane Hospital in the final Hospital trained Nursing cohort before it became solely University trained. I worked in several areas of the hospital including oncology, medical, urology, paediatrics, accident and emergency, theatre and ear, nose and throat wards. I completed 2 out of the 3-year course before resigning and enrolling at QUT to undertake a teaching degree.

I commenced my Teaching Degree in 1991 and in my final year coupled this with getting married and playing rugby league for Brisbane Wests Panthers which we played the Grand Final against Redcliffe Dolphins. We lost but was informed shortly after that I was selected to tour South Africa for the Queensland Residents. I was lucky enough to play all but one game on tour including a Test Match against the South African International side which we won. Upon return for the South African tour I commenced playing for the South Queensland Crushers in their lower grades and persevered through the season hampered with injury. During this time, I was also in my first year of teaching at Deception Bay North teaching Grade 7.

Off note I could see firsthand how the Super League war in rugby league was being played out with players openly discussing this during training.

In 2003, I represented Australia in the Men's 30's at the Touch Football World Cup in Japan. And currently sit on the Queensland Touch Football Board. The following year I was transferred to the Gold Coast and started teaching in a 3-teacher school. I remained there for 3 years before moving to North Queensland and doing a Teaching Principal role. During this time, our two sons were born Harrison and Braiden.

I returned to Brisbane as a Deputy Principal at Serviceton South in Inala before returning to the Gold Coast in a variety of positions and schools. Currently I am the Principal of Burleigh Heads State School and have been in this position for the past 9 years.



History of Mt Maria College Mitchelton

Mt Maria, comprising the Good Shepherd Convent, Home and Laundry, was opened in 1931 as an Industrial School for girls. Industrial Schools for girls were homes "licensed by the State for the reception of delinquent girls". They were for girls who had "offended sexually or committed crimes" with the aim of the home being to stabilise the girls' character.

The Good Shepherd Sisters had a history of caring for young girls in danger, who were unprotected and unquarded. Consequently, it is estimated that, in the years between 1831 and 1974, over 1,800 girls passed through Mt Maria. In its peak period of the 1950s and 1960s, in any one year there would have been as many as 98 teenage girls continually in residence. The Sisters also cared for a small number of girls with intellectual disabilities as well as fifteen or so older girls. Many were sent to Mt Maria direct from the Courts, some because they were declared uncontrollable at home, others because they were simply destitute and had nowhere else to turn. The minimum age was 14 although there were girls here of 13 years of age and a few as young as 12 years of age.

In 1966, the institution was renamed The Mt Maria Re-Education Centre.

A New Chapter for Mt Maria College

"The Catholic Leader" of 14 November, 1976, telegraphed further changes with its headline: "Mitchelton girls home to be co-educational school conducted by archdiocese". It went on to say that "A senior co-educational college is to be opened by the Archdiocese of Brisbane at Mitchelton in 1978, as a result of a decision by the Catholic Education Council."

However, a premature beginning took place in 1977, with Marcellin College moving its second senior class into the site a year early. The Marcellin Years 11 and 12 boys moved because of accommodation problems posed by increasing Grade 8 enrolments at Marcellin College's Enoggera campus. Refer to the family tree for a timeline of the history of the College.

The plan was to make The Good Shepherd Convent/Mt Maria Youth Centre site a senior co-educational college for students from St Benedict's Girls College at Wilston and Marcellin Boys College at Enoggera. The Marist Brothers were invited to administer this new senior co-educational college, with Brother Terence Heinrich as the first Principal. This proposal was endorsed by the Mother-General of the Good Samaritan Sisters who administered St Benedict's. The campus retained the name of Mt Maria, and so, on 25th January 1978, the first senior co-educational classes were assembled at Mt Maria Senior College, Mitchelton.

In the late 1980s, all three colleges operated together as "Combined Colleges" when competing in sporting events such as Interschool Swimming and Athletics. This served to strengthen the ties between Mitchelton, Enoggera and Wilston.

Marcellin College at Enoggera remained a boys school until 1992, catering for Years 5-7 in the Primary School and Years 8-10 in Junior Secondary, both schools operating on the same site with separate administrations. The primary classes were phased out during 1984-6 in line with Catholic Education Office policy of retaining primary education in parish schools. In 1992, Marcellin Junior Secondary amalgamated with the junior secondary classes from St Benedict's Girls College, to form Mt Maria Junior Secondary Co-educational College on the Enoggera campus. St Benedict's College closed at the end of the 1991 academic year.

Mt Maria Senior at Mitchelton and Mt Maria Junior at Enoggera continued to operate as separate colleges with their own principals until 2006 when one administrator was appointed to oversee both campuses. In 2012 and 2013, Year Levels were phased from Enoggera into Mt Maria Mitchelton; and Grade 7 students were added in 2015 in consequence of the Queensland Government decision to follow other states and include Year 7 in secondary school campuses.
