The Joy of Belonging to a Catholic School Community

At Mt Maria College, we believe that every student is a unique and valued member of our community. As part of Brisbane Catholic Education and Marist Schools Australia, and in partnership with the Grovely, Samford, and Mitchelton Parishes, we are proud to offer a faith-filled environment where students and families are welcomed with open hearts.

Faith in Action

The Religious Life of the College is central to who we are. From the beginning of the school year with our Welcome and Investiture Liturgy, to the final celebration of the Year 12 Graduation Mass, we mark key liturgical moments with respect and joy. Students participate in liturgies, House Masses, prayer rituals, and assemblies that reflect our Catholic identity and Marist charism.

Our Religious Education curriculum, taught from Year 7 to Year 12, is grounded in the life and teachings of Jesus Christ and inspired by St Marcellin Champagnat. All students, regardless of their personal beliefs, are invited to engage respectfully and meaningfully in this learning journey.

Spiritual Growth and Reflection

Retreats and reflection days are offered at each year level, providing students with opportunities to pause, connect, and grow spiritually. Our Campus Minister works closely with the Assistant Principal – Faith & Mission to support the spiritual and pastoral development of students and staff, encouraging everyone to use their gifts in service to others.

Each day after lunch, the College embraces a moment of stillness and silence. A gentle musical piece plays as students and staff take five minutes to reflect, pray, or simply be present. This practice nurtures mindfulness and enhances focus and wellbeing.

Living the Gospel Through Service

Social justice is at the heart of our Catholic mission. Students and families are encouraged to support key charities including Caritas – Project Compassion, Marist Asia Pacific Solidarity, Catholic Mission, and St Vincent de Paul. Service-learning opportunities are embedded throughout the school experience, helping students to see beyond themselves and make a positive impact in the wider community.

Senior students may also participate in immersion experiences and support outreach programs such as Rosie's Friends on the Street and Emmanuel City Mission. Our SECA Service program further extends opportunities for meaningful engagement for students from Years 9 to 12. The Year 7 and 8 cohorts are invited to participate in the Marist Youth Game Changers program.

Celebrating Culture and Identity

Mt Maria College proudly supports Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students through our Mt Maria Mob group. With the guidance of our Indigenous Liaison Officer, students explore their heritage through cultural and educational activities. Our Yarning Circle, located beside the Oval, is a special space for storytelling, connection, and reflection.

Pastoral Care

The wellbeing and care of our students is a fundamental aspect of Marist Catholic education. The College places significant emphasis on our Pastoral Care program based on the educational philosophy of Marcellin Champagnat.

We are a strong community which believes in developing positive relationships within a family atmosphere where people are welcomed, respected, and valued. We believe learning is life-long and occurs both inside and outside of the classroom.

Pastoral Care for students in Years 7-12 is provided through a vertical seven House system. This vertical approach sees the students of the College being encouraged and supported by their Pastoral Leader and Pastoral Care Group teachers. The Pastoral Leader is responsible for the organisation of each House and the pastoral wellbeing of students in their House. Pastoral Leaders work alongside Curriculum Leaders, Guidance Counsellors, Inclusive Education Support Leaders, and the College Leadership Team who work together with parents to provide an infrastructure which aims to support every student in our College community.

Each student belongs to a Pastoral Care Group consisting of students across all year levels from their House group. The House system and Pastoral Care Groups promote a strong sense of community, personal care, and leadership opportunities. Special care is given to Year 7 students in helping them to make the transition from primary to a large secondary school.

Pastoral Care Groups

Within each House, there are Pastoral Care Groups which consist of approximately 25 students ranging from Years 7 to 12. The Pastoral Care Group teachers work in partnership with the Pastoral Leader, undertaking the daily pastoral care of students. Pastoral Care Teachers should be the first point of contact for parents should a student wellbeing issue arise. The House system and Pastoral Care Groups promote a strong sense of community which enhances student wellbeing.

Pastoral Care Group is where students report to in the morning to be marked off on the roll, pray together, listen to the daily notices and important information and organise their books and other equipment for the day of learning ahead.

College Counsellors

The College Counsellors are available to assist students in their personal and academic growth. They focus on enhancing the mental health and resilience of all students, including those considered at risk and those with special needs, and provide career advice to students.

Defence School Mentor

Mt Maria College is aware of the unique educational needs of students whose parents are members of the Australian Defence Force. The government sponsored role of the Defence School Mentor at the College is to provide support and assistance to students of ADF families and to hopefully alleviate some of the concerns that families may have when transferring to a new school.

Positive Relationships at Mt Maria College

Our staff are trained to recognise and respond to bullying. We also empower students to manage conflict, speak up for themselves and others, and contribute to a culture of care and respect.

Bullying isn't always obvious. It's not just physical harm, it can show up as exclusion, rumours, subtle put-downs, or online messages that leave someone feeling isolated or anxious.

Together, we can create a safe and supportive environment for your child.

Here are three ways you can stay actively involved in this process:

Recognising the signs at home

Watch for changes in your child's behaviour, such as:

- Avoiding school or social situations.
- Mood swings, withdrawal, or sudden anxiety.
- Unexplained physical complaints or damaged belongings.
- Hesitation to use devices or go online.

These may be signs that something's not right—and we're here to help.

Keep the conversation going

Talk regularly with your child about:

- What it means to be an upstander someone who speaks up or supports others when they see bullying.
- How to respond safely and respectfully, like saying "We don't do that here" or checking in with someone who's been targeted.
- The importance of telling a trusted adult if they or someone else is being treated unfairly.
- Let them know that being kind, inclusive, and brave makes a real difference.

Stay connected with us

We're committed to open communication between school and home. If you have concerns, questions, or just want to check in, please reach out. Our Pastoral House Leaders, counsellors, and leadership team are here to listen and act.

Together, we can build a culture where every student feels safe, valued, and supported.

Curriculum

Belief About Learning

Promoting excellence and equity, Mt Maria College supports a student-centred, holistic approach to education, recognising that students have different strengths, needs and backgrounds. We affirm our commitment to the importance of meeting these individual needs, with a focus on student progress and growth, regardless of the starting point.

Our educational goals have as a specific focus, the building of students' capacity to develop empathy-enhanced skills in collaboration, creativity, critical thinking, and communication. We work to unlock the potential of each student, aspiring to extend their potential, and develop agency for their learning to be active and informed members of the community.

We affirm education's role in developing young people's resilience and mental wellbeing, enabling them to confidently recognise, adapt to, and manage change.

In making our vision a reality, we have high expectations of our students and staff. We support all students – irrespective of their background, relative advantage, or cultural heritage – to develop a growth mindset to enable their progress into self-directed, confident, and creative lifelong learners. Our teachers aspire to be positive, enthusiastic, and engaging to facilitate differentiated, quality teaching and learning experiences which will engage and motivate our students.

Learning and Teaching

Mt Maria College offers a tailored program of study from Year 7-12 underpinned by our Marist values – Presence, Family Spirit, Love of Hard Work and Simplicity. To this end, the College offers programs within two distinct phases of schooling – Middle Years (7-9) and Senior Years (10-12).

This sub-school separation enables Mt Maria College to:

- Enhance and develop curriculum and support structures appropriate to the students' developmental and intellectual needs.
- Expand specialist facilities, tuition, and support necessary to complement the child's growth and development.

Mt Maria College Pedagogical Framework

Our school-wide Pedagogical Framework translates our vision into everyday practice and is based on the belief that every student can learn. It provides a consistent, evidence-based set of guidelines and resources to support our teachers in delivering high quality teaching that maximises learning for all students.



We foster a strong academic culture by:

- Utilising innovative, high-quality and proven teaching practices
- Fostering a growth mindset
- Setting high expectations of teachers and students
- Differentiating learning experiences
- Celebrating student success

We aim to work in partnership with parents to achieve the best outcomes for our students. Student academic progress is carefully monitored, and it is our expectation that every student works hard at their learning through active participation in class and completing all set tasks.

Assessment

We assess student learning in accordance with the Australian Curriculum Achievement Standards and QCAA assessment policies. The sequence of achievement standards within each learning area emphasises the depth of conceptual understanding, sophistication of skills, and the ability to apply essential knowledge expected of students.

At Mt Maria College, assessment is aligned with the designated curriculum, unit overviews and learning experiences in each class. Assessment is differentiated as required to meet the learning needs of our students.

Reporting

The College reports (A-E) twice a year across Year 7-12 according to ACARA and QCAA achievement standards. Year 7-10 reports are based on semester units of work while reports are issued at the end of each Unit in Year 11 and 12. An interim report measuring student engagement is also provided at the end of Term 1 for students in Year 7-11. All report cards are available on the BCE Connect App.



Curriculum Overview

At Mt Maria College, students engage in a range of authentic learning experiences and opportunities in accordance with BCE Religious Education Curriculum, Australian Curriculum (Years 7-10), QCAA Year 11 and 12 General, Applied and Extension subjects, and a range of Vocation Education & Training Certificate (I-IV) subjects offered both on campus and externally through our community partners.

Students in Year 7 and 8 study a designated program and have the opportunity to choose elective subjects for Year 9 to complement their core studies. Students can refine their elective subjects for Year 10 with greater specialization of knowledge and skills encouraged, before choosing their pathway and subjects for Year 11 and 12 as part of their SET Plan.

Technology Policy



Mt Maria College understands that mobile phones and wearable devices are a part of life now for many students. However, there is no need to carry them around during the day or bring them to classes (earbuds or headphones may be used in class under the direction of the teacher) for the following reasons:

- They are a distraction to learning and teaching during class time.
- · They can encourage anti-social behaviour.
- Their value generally requires that extra care be taken with regard to security, which cannot be guaranteed by the College.

If these items are brought to school, students must take the responsibility for their own property.

Procedures for mobile phone usage

- 1.Students are not to carry mobile phones with them (including in folders or pencil cases etc) during the school day. Once the bell for Pastoral Care Group is sounded phones are to be turned off and locked in a student's locker. Alternatively, students can hand them in to Student Reception or to a student's Pastoral Leader for safe keeping.
- 2. Students are not to record (image or sound) class lessons or any other activities at school. This is in keeping with our privacy guidelines.
- 3. Wearable devices are to be considered under the same guiding principles as mobile phones as many of their smart functions are an extension of the mobile phone. e.g. making and receiving phone calls, messaging, accessing apps etc. Wearable devices are permitted in the classroom however are not to be used as an extension of the mobile phone.
- 4. Earbuds and headphones must not be used at break times or between classes.

Students who do not adhere to these guidelines will be subject to the standard College behaviour management procedures.

The College will not take any responsibility if these items are lost or stolen but will advertise any such losses to assist in their recovery.

If students are found with these devices on them throughout the day they will be expected to hand them in to a specified member of staff (e.g. Pastoral Leader or at Student Reception) and they can be collected at 3.00pm. Parent contact will be made with repeat offenders or if a student becomes argumentative or uncooperative.





Mt Maria College recognises that social media is commonly used by the wider local and global community to express their views, ideas, comments and critcisms on a wide range of issues.

The Social Media Guidelines (for Students) has been developed to provide our community with a set of standards of behaviour for the use of social media that are consistent with the College's expectations and values.

The following key principles apply to student social media use:

- Your online presence should always be respectful and considerate of the rights and confidentiality of others.
- You must ensure that your personal online activities do not impact on the College's reputation or the reputation of any member of the College community.
- You must not use the College's name and/or crest on social media sites.
- You must not post photos of yourself or other students in school uniform or in the school setting.
- You must not post photos of staff, parents or other students without permission.
- Consider your "digital footprint". Your online behaviour can impact your future career path.





College Uniform

The College uniform is a symbol of school pride and a reflection of the high standards upheld by our community. Students are required to wear the complete and correct College uniform neatly and with care at all times—during school hours, at official College functions, and while travelling to and from the College.

Wearing the uniform appropriately demonstrates respect for oneself, fellow students, and the traditions of both current and past members of the College community.

In the event that a student is unable to wear the correct uniform, a written explanation from a parent or caregiver must be provided. This note should outline the reason for the non-compliance and indicate the expected timeframe for resolving the matter.

All items of the College uniform are to be clean, pressed, and properly fitted to ensure a neat and professional appearance at all times.

All uniform items (except shoes) are available from the College Uniform Shop, located near the Samaritan court at the Prospect Road carpark.


Your BCE Connect experience has been tailored to your needs. Log absences for one or more children at a single time. Find school related information, in a single place and receive targeted communications.


Attendance

Absences

The BCE Connect app is the preferred option to advise the school of student absences. This can be done by clicking on the 'absences' tile on the Mt Maria College homepage within the app.

It is requested, where possible, that absences are reported by 8.30am on the day of absence.

Unexplained Absences will be sent in a text to parents/guardians, usually between 10.00am and 12.00pm.



Arriving Late

Students who arrive late to school after the 8.30am bell are to report directly to Student Reception to sign in and collect their late slip to present to their teacher.

If you know your son/daughter will be late please send them in with a note explaining their absence or send a notification through the BCE Connect app.

Unexplained late arrivals will be sent via text to parents/guardians, usually between 10.00am and 12.00pm.

When your child has an appointment/needs to leave during school time

When a parent or carer has arranged an appointment during school time for their son/daughter, they should write a note in their child's diary or on paper to allow them to show the class teacher and submit a late arrival/early departure notification via the 'absences' tile on the BCE Connect app.

Students must go to Student Reception and wait for collection by a parent/guardian.

All students are to present at Student Reception for appointments or sickness to sign out and wait for collection by a parent.

For students in Years 7–10, a parent/carer must physically come to Parent Reception to collect a student. The College does not permit Year 7-10 students to leave the College unaccompanied. A parent must complete the relevant emergency contact forms for any person other than the parents, collecting a student during school hours.

When your child is sick/unwell at school

If students are feeling unwell at school, they may ask their teacher for permission to leave class and immediately report to Student Reception.

After 30 minutes in the sick bay, students will be given the option to either return to their timetabled class or have a parent/carer contacted to arrange for them to be collected from school.

Students are not to phone parents to arrange collection when they are unwell. This will be handled by the office staff to avoid disruptions during class time and ensure we know where students are at all times.

The Student Reception area is for students only. All parents coming to Mt Maria College must report to Parent Reception.

Parent Slips

Mt Maria College utilises Parent Slips (also known as EdSmart), a paperless permission form system which links with the BCE Connect App.

Instead of paper permission forms for excursions and camps coming home in your child's school bag, you will be sent an email notification with a link to click that opens a secure web page version of the form to complete and submit.

You can do this on your phone, tablet, or computer at your convenience. Teachers will discuss these excursions and camps with students at school, but please ensure you have a conversation with your student/s about their upcoming activities and let them know you have given permission for them to attend.

All the data you submit in these forms is held in a secure database only accessible to selected College staff.

Parents can also check and respond to outstanding Parent Slips via the BCE Connect App.



My Student Account Funds



- On-campus shopping for your child without cash using their Student ID
- On-line orders/payments (sport, Unform Shop, Events, Other)

My Student Account (MSA) allows you as a parent/carer to add funds to your child's ID card for the purchase of items on Campus. It also allows you to include information on the card as to how you want your child to utilise those funds on the card. Eg \$15 limit on tuckshop per day/week.

Once you have successfully added funds to your child's account, this can be used in the tuckshop for purchases at break times, to top up print values or to purchase items at the Uniform shop. More and more functionality will be added to our MSA outlets to eventually include the purchase of replacement laptop chargers, obtain replacement ID cards and locks, use for fundraisers etc.

MSA online system allows you to pay for additional school items through the College & Uniform Shops using your credit card or the credit balance on your MSA account. Your MSA portal is where you can conveniently add funds to your child's student ID at any time of the day.

Fee Information

As a Brisbane Catholic Education College, Mt Maria College is not fully funded by government grants. For this reason, the College sets the tuition fee annually to reflect current costs in the operation of the school.

Fees and levies collected at Mt Maria College are used to provide a high-quality education for the following purposes, which are aligned with the College's Vision and Mission:

·Provide quality teaching and learning, administrative services, classroom support and facilities

- Provide essential resources, materials, facilities, and equipment
- Provide access to 1:1 College owned laptop program
- Assist with providing learning enhancement activities such as excursions, presentations, workshops
- Student Welfare and Pastoral Care programs
- Support the Mt Maria College building program
- Maintain buildings, grounds and other facilities

When your child is enrolled at Mt Maria College, you provide an undertaking that you will do all that is possible to pay the fees that are charged in accordance with the College fee policy. As a matter of justice to all members of the community, and not to adversely affect the delivery of curriculum and co-curricular activities, College fees are expected to be paid in the year they are incurred. We understand that circumstances may change and our team are committed to assist with solutions that suit individual needs.

Fees and levies are charged once per year at the beginning of the year and are to be paid by the due date in term one or by a payment arrangement using the FACTs platform. Instalments may be set in the FACTs platform to suit the family budget e.g. weekly, fortnightly, monthly or quarterly from your account or credit card. Updated statements will be sent each month or at the beginning of each term.

There are two dedicated afternoon school buses (951 and 952) which take students to Everton Hills, Albany Creek and Eatons Hill. They depart at 3.10pm and 3.15pm from the bus stop at Mitchelton train station – refer to Translink for more information.

Pick Up/Drop Off Area

We have two designated drop off and pick up areas which can be accessed via the Prospect Road and Osborne Road entrances. The Stop, Drop, Go zones are for pick up and drop off only. If you need to come into the College office, please park in the allocated visitor carparks off Prospect and Osborne Road.

College Newsletter

The College newsletter is distributed three times during each school term, usually on a Friday. It will be emailed to your inbox and is also available via the BCE Connect app.

Parent/Teacher/Student Conferences

The College will report Academic Achievement and Academic Progress throughout the year. Families will have the opportunity to attend Parent/Teacher/Student conferences in a formal structured environment during the year. If you have any queries or concerns, you are welcome to contact your child's teachers via email. Staff emails are available through the BCE Connect app.

Student Lockers

Each student is allocated a locker and provided with a combination lock. Students are to keep their bags and valuables (including mobile phones) in their locker during school time and go to their lockers before morning Pastoral Care Group and during breaks to organise books and other equipment. Students are allowed to check their mobile phone during break times while at their lockers.

Medication/First Aid

If a student requires medication to be dispensed at school A Request to Administer Medication Form or Request to Administer Paracetamol form can be collected from the College's office and is also available on the BCE Connect app. Paracetamol is not supplied or given to students. There are First Aid Officers in the College Office for students who are injured during school time. Necessary precautions will be taken with first aid care. If your student has serious allergies or medical requirements, please advise Student Reception before the start of the school year so the College can document an Action Plan for the student.

IT Helpdesk

The Mt Maria College IT Helpdesk is open between the hours of 8am to 2pm. The IT Helpdesk provides the following services for students and their families:

- Diagnose and arrange repair of 1:1 College provided laptops in-line with Dell & LENOVO in 2026 Warranty and Service Conditions
- Manages accidental damage protection or warranty claims for your College provided 1:1 laptop
- Advocate with Dell & Lenovo to get the fastest/most cost-effective repairs
- Provide a loan laptop while a student's laptop is being repaired, conditional of all claim excessed being paid*
- Charge student's laptop
- Reimage (reload) the software on laptops if requested
- Maintain a service history of all laptops
- Top up student print card money
- Sell replacement or additional power supplies and laptop bags
- Create or replace student print cards including taking ID photos subject to availability
